# These Activity Pages Are Designed To:

- Engage students in a way that lecture and open-ended discussion don't.
- Gain insight on what has been learned and what hasn't.
- Encourage students to learn from one another and build vital relationships, in keeping with Proverbs 27:17 and Galatians 6:2.

# Tips For Using Activity Pages:

- Instructions are on each lesson's "Involvement Learning" page (for teachers) and Activity Page (for students).
- Use these pages as optional alternatives for "Involvement Learning" activities.
- Limit individual work time and focus on facilitating discussion among learners.
- Encourage students to complete take-home work by discussing their results in the next class session.

# Maximize Group Activity Time!

- Instead of viewing group activities as empty time for you as the teacher, look for opportunities to encourage and challenge your students.
- Pray silently during the activity for the participants' spiritual growth! Pray for them by name, calling on the Lord to bless each person.
- Circulate among the groups of learners and observe their interactions to discover your learners' level of spiritual maturity.
- Pray that the Spirit will fall on your classroom, equipping your students with knowledge and filling them with passion to boldly proclaim the good news.

			<b>Shaming Rituals:</b> an at-fault person is publicly shamed as a form of resolution, justice, and deterrence.
			Gift Giving: compensation is given as a way to resolve disputes and restore relationships.
			<i>Trial by Combat:</i> disputes are resolved through physical combat, with the winner considered to be in the right.
			<i>Mediation by Elders:</i> disputes are resolved by a group of respected elders who serve as mediators or arbitrators.
			<b>Shamanic Intervention:</b> disputes are resolved through spiritual or supernatural means involving a shaman.

Possible cross-references: Exodus 22; Numbers 22; 1 Samuel 17; 2 Samuel 10:4-5; Galatians 5:20-21.

### CREATIVE PROBLEM-SOLVING

Family members were in a heated dispute over the inheritance of their late grandmother's antique table. Each family member felt deserving of it, and tensions were high. They tried to talk it out, but each was already self-convinced. Ultimately, they decided to put the table up for auction and donate the proceeds to a charity their grandmother had been passionate about. This solution helped them honor their grandmother, both by giving to a cause she cared about and by getting along with one another.






